Something strange is happening when Su-mi and her younger sister Su-Yeon come home after a hospital stay.



Salma goes all the way to the Israeli Supreme Court to try and save her trees, taking her deep into the complex, dark and sometimes funny chaos of the ongoing struggle in the Middle East. Capturing the harsh realities of the Mexican Revolution, the film follows the six soldiers as they fight for freedom, watch their compadres fall during battle and suffer the mental and physical hardships of civil war, culminating in Villa's brutal retribution against defector Tiburcio.
