Bishopric Message:

First of all, I would like to thank each of you for the wonderful examples you are to me and the way in which you serve one another.

Two of my favorite scriptures related to this time of year are:

"For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." John 3:16

"For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given: and the government shall be upon his shoulder: and his name shall be called Wonderful, Counselor, The mighty God, The everlasting Father, The Prince of Peace." Isaiah 9:6

These verses, along with many others, teach us that our Heavenly Father provided His only begotten Son to us in order for us to be able to return to Him, through personal belief and righteous action. Why? Because He loves us – each and every one of us. Many authors have captured the essence of this joyful season, but perhaps none more simply and eloquently than O. Henry in his story "The Gift of the Maji." Most of us may know this story, but I'd like to recount it:

A young couple, James "Jim" Young and his wife, Della, were very much in love with each other. Twenty-two year old Jim made a salary of just \$8.00/week – barely enough to provide food and shelter for the couple. Jim wanted more than anything to give Della something she really wanted for Christmas, and knew just what that was – a beautifully crafted set of combs to accent her knee-length hair that she had shown him several times in the store window.

Della had been saving for months to buy Jim a Christmas present as well – a chain for the gold pocket watch that had once belonged to his father and grandfather. It cost \$21.00, and she had managed to save exactly \$1.87 by Christmas Eve. As she considered what to do, she was discouraged, but an idea came to her; she smiled and headed out the door.

When Jim came home that night, he had a happy heart and a beautiful set of combs in his pocket. Della was anxiously awaiting his arrival, but when he came in the door, he just stared at her, his mouth hanging open. All he could manage to say is "Della, you've cut off your hair?" Della answered "I had my hair cut off and sold it because I couldn't have lived through Christmas without giving you a present."

Of course, Jim had sold his watch so that Della could have the combs she longed for and Della had sold her hair so Jim could have a chain for the watch he was so attached to. They agreed to "put them up for a while, because they were just too nice to use right now."

The beauty of this story is that the love Jim and Della had for each other motivated each of them to think only of the other person and to sacrifice something that was very dear to them because of that love. This is exactly what our Heavenly Father did for each of us by giving us His Son to enable us to have everlasting life and return to Him.

This Christmas season, it is my prayer that each of us will remember the story of Jim and Della as we reflect on what this wonderful season celebrates -- the **gift of our Savior**, **Jesus Christ**, that we will forget ourselves and that we will focus on the needs of others.


influence their lives and strengthen their testimonies. We have such incredible Young Women!

MISSIONARY

Report from Elder Andrew Isom - Brazil

Last P-day Monday night (October 4th) we went over to Vila Americana to contact. It was dark and late and we were getting denied. Then we stopped a random man (about 30 yrs old) walking down the street. We introduced ourselves and told him what we were doing here and about our message and he said things I've never heard anyone else say to us. He said: "I want to talk to you two. I think it's important to talk to you and I have a feeling like we should talk." We were pumped and made an appointment to return the next night at 6. we parted and he walked up the street and we went the opposite way. 20 seconds later we hear: "Americanos! Americanos!" and we turn around and he is running down the middle of the street to us. He said if God put you in my path tonight I'm going to talk with you tonight. We sat on the curb and taught him about a restoration of the truth--that the true church is on the earth today. He was so receptive and so excited. We went back the next day to teach more. We went in his house. it is old, small, and empty except for a bed, table, and 2 wooden chairs.

He told us his story... Paulo separated with his woman many years ago because of drugs. Paulo has 3 teenage kids and none live with him. .He started smoking and then got into cocaine... He lost his family and now he has nothing. He wants a knew life, but he is so addicted to cocaine. We asked him to kneel and pray after we talked to him and he said the most heartfelt prayer I've ever heard in my life.

We visited him everyday last week. We would call him every night to give him strength not to buy drugs that night. He said one night we called him when he was about to buy drugs, but since we called he was able to resist. Sunday, October 10th, was amazing. A day I'll never forget. Paulo came to church on his own. He sat through perfect lessons in priesthood and gospel principles on repentance and eternal families. He came in jeans and his jacket but brought his Book of Mormon and Bible. He was participating and answering questions. It was so good.

Then we had sacrament. fast and testimony meeting. Elder Campbell and I got up and shared our testimonies and then when we sat down he looked at me and asked if he could go up. I was shocked. An investigator, first time at church, wanted to go up. I said of course you can. I was a little worried what would happen but he got up there and shared the most amazing testimony I've heard. He shared the story of how we met him and his love for us and shared his thanks for how this is changing his life. He shared his testimony of Joseph Smith as a prophet. It touched the whole ward. When he came back everyone was going up sharing testimonies of their conversion and missionary work. Our ward mission leader (a 22 yr old returned missionary) went up and shared an emotional testimony of missionary work and how this ward could trust me and Elder Campbell. It was emotional for me. Afterward everyone said this was the most spiritual sacrament meeting they've had in years. The ward is changing. Paulo Marcello will be baptized this Sunday,

The story of Paulo is why I'm on a mission. It's why we serve missions. There are people like this man, elect, walking the streets looking for answers. We just have to find them. The ward really trusts us now and I think we can do big things here. I'm excited for a good week.

The story of Paulo Marcelo had a great ending. I had the opportunity to baptize him for my first baptism ever on October 17th. It was sooo cool and it felt so good... Paulo was so excited and felt really good. I gave him one of my ties and Elder Campbell gave him a shirt to wear to church that day. It was sweet. On Sunday, October 24th, Paulo Marcelo was confirmed. He moved from his old house last week to a new one to kinda forget his past. He has nothing though except a bed and TV. We have 3 fridges in our house so Sunday we got a member with a truck to help us haul one of them to his house. He was way excited.

My testimony grew through my trials. My Heavenly Father guided me through years of rearing my family, sending them on missions etc. I have experienced several serious illnesses including cancer and I was blessed to overcome another crisis. Again my Heavenly Father was there for me in every instance.

When I was asked to submit this article I was asked to include my testimony of the heavenly blessing of music in my life. Great music is truly a divine gift and is heavenly inspired. It has been an integral part of my life and through it I have been truly blessed. It has provided me a career of teaching piano lessons for more than fifty years as well as

performing as a soloist and an accompanist for many fine singers, instrumentalists, and many choruses.

This has been a source of indescribable joy and blessing. It is one of Heavenly Father's great gifts and I am truly thankful for it in my life. I am also grateful for all of Heavenly Father's blessings, for the Atonement, for my membership in the true church, for my membership in the Grandview 9th ward and for all my special, loving friends here.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

When loved ones become sick or injured, nothing is more important than providing immediate care and comfort. Even 911 cannot respond as fast as a family member reaching into an organized and well-stocked first-aid kit to provide treatment and pain relief until paramedics arrive. A basic supply of first-aid items will prepare you for that future emergency – when every second counts.

A basic first-aid kit may be purchased at the local Red Cross office, drugstore, or emergency essentials outlet. However, first-aid supplies may also be collected into any metal, wood, or plastic container with a tight-fitting cover.

In addition to your consecrated oil and required family medicines, consider placing the following supplies into your first-aid kit:

- 1. sterile gauze of different sizes with adhesive tape;
- 2. adhesive and elastic bandages with a splint;
- 3. acetaminophen and ibuprofen;
- 4. flashlight with extra batteries;
- 5. tweezers, sharp scissors, safety pins;
- 6. disposable instant cold packs;
- 7. thermometer and a blanket;
- 8. plastic non-latex gloves; numbers.
- 9. mouthpiece for CPR (from local Red Cross); and
- 10. local emergency phone
- 11. alcohol wipes, soap, antibiotic ointment, and Calamine lotion;
- 12. Hydrogen Peroxide, Hydrocortisone cream (1%), and Ethyl alcohol;

IMPORTANT: Remember to rotate your medications to stay within expiration dates, and add extra supplies to meet the needs of your own family,

Consider giving the gift of a homemade first-aid kit for Christmas.



We testify that the Brethren have counseled us to care for ourselves and our families in time of emergency; it is our prayer that we will obey that counsel by ensuring that our first-aid kits are sufficiently stocked and ready for a time of accident or illness.
